



European Security and Defence in the 21st Century International and European Law Perspectives

In a nutshell: The European security and defence landscape is both captivating and complex, offering a rich web of legally unexplored dimensions. Amidst this complexity, there are numerous issues of international and European law that require closer scrutiny. In a half-day interactive workshop, we aim to unravel some of the legal intricacies of European security and defence—a topic that will remain at the forefront of academic and political discussions in the years to come.

Format of the workshop: The event will bring together scholars specialising in international and European law with a view to engaging in a comprehensive and critical discussion on European security and defence in the 21st century. There will be two thematic panels dealing with general legal issues as well as specific cases and contexts, such as the war in Ukraine.

Guiding questions: Discussions will unfold along the following (non-exhaustive) list of topics:

- Global governance challenges: How is the current geopolitical turmoil changing the foundations and guiding principles of the international and European legal order(s)? How can European security and defence be guaranteed in the long term and what role does the law play in this? Is there any legal room for manoeuvre for common European nuclear weapons?
- Institutional challenges: Do legal and institutional changes signal a reshaping of the European security architecture, influenced by a paralysed Security Council and dwindling US security guarantees? Who is actually responsible for European security and defence—the EU, NATO or both? What impact does the increase in the EU's security and defence instruments, e.g. the financing of arms deliveries to Ukraine, have?
- Distributional and equality challenges: How do questions of security and defence inform the distribution of resources as well as the design of global geographies? How do changes in the security and defence landscape bear upon questions of global inequalities?
- Policy challenges: Does the recent increase in realpolitik considerations lead to recognisable shifts in the protection of fundamental rights? How can European security and defence policy evolve in the light of technological progress, including advances in AI and autonomous weapons systems? (How) can we envisage a legally and economically sound European defence industry? (How) do deal with a new type of risks, such as climate change or hybrid campaigns?

Target audience: We invite young, mid-career and senior academics as well as PhD researchers and students to join us and contribute their insights on the abovementioned guiding questions related to the current European security and defence landscape.
